	India and Australia share many common interests in the development of the service sector. Their service sectors are connected with each other to a high level, with significant transactions in education, tourism and information technology. However there is also common interest in many questions about service sector development, including the determinants of productivity growth and employment. There is interest in India in the Australian response to structural change and to the importance of driving higher growth rates of productivity in services. There is interest in Australia in the model of development in India and the different path of service sector development, compared to China for example. Researchers in both countries share a common interest in the development and application of policy related research in the service sector. The services business sector in both economies continues to examine options for direct business relations as well as the scope for cooperation in order to compete in third country markets.
	Dialogue Themes:
	1. Identify trends in the services sector in both economies and in the evolution of business strategy in that context (the business theme)
	2. Compare and consolidate research on services of mutual interest (the research theme), including:
	services trade and its measurement
	services innovation

	<ul> <li>services regulatory reform and underlying principles</li> </ul>
	3. Review current policy issues in services within each economy and discuss those which are examined in other forums, including the WTO and in bilateral agreements (the policy theme)
