


Monthly Summary of International Student Enrolment Data¹ – Australia – YTD May 2015

As at year-to-date (YTD) May 2015, there were 448,661 enrolments by full-fee paying international students in Australia on a student visa. This represents an 11.0% increase on YTD May 2014 and compares with the average YTD May growth rate for enrolments of 5.1% per year over the preceding ten years.

There were 182,618 commencements, in the YTD May 2015 representing an 8.6% increase over YTD May 2014. This compares with the average YTD May growth rate for commencements of 6.1% per year over the preceding ten years.

The higher education sector had the largest share of enrolments at 48.6% in the YTD May 2015. Enrolments and commencements increased by 9.4% and 7.6% over the same period in 2014. China and India accounted for 35.4% and 11.7% respectively of enrolments by students in higher education. In YTD May 2015, post-graduate research commencements declined slightly by 1.9%,



while other post-graduate commencements in higher education grew by 2.8% over the same period in 2014. Bachelor degree level commencements also increased, by 15.7%.

The VET sector accounted for 24.6% of total enrolments and 28.2% of total commencements respectively. Enrolments in the sector increased by 15.7% and commencements grew by 13.7% on YTD May 2014 figures. India had the largest share of total enrolments (17.5%) in YTD May 2015. The Republic of Korea and China had the next largest shares of VET enrolments with 8.3% and 8.1% respectively.

The English Language Intensive Courses for Overseas Students (ELICOS) sector accounted for 18.1% of total enrolments and 26.0% of total commencements in YTD May 2015. Enrolments and commencement increased by 7.6% and 4.2% respectively on the same period in 2014. China accounted for the largest cohort of enrolments and commencements in ELICOS with shares of 24.9% and 22.1% respectively. Brazil was the next largest nationality for ELICOS enrolments with 8.4%, followed by Thailand and Colombia (8.2% and 6.8% respectively).

In YTD May 2015, the schools sector accounted for 3.5% of total enrolments and commencements respectively. Enrolments for the sector grew by 12.5% and commencements by 19.3% on YTD May 2014 figures. Asia contributed 87.5% of enrolments and 82.3% of commencements. By nationality, China had the largest share of enrolments in schools accounting for 49.6%, followed by Vietnam and the Republic of Korea at 9.3% and 7.3% respectively.

Enrolments and commencements in the non-award courses (such as exchange and foundation programs) increased by 15.9% and 6.2% respectively. China (30.2%), USA (13.5%) and Brazil (10.6%) accounted for more enrolments in non-award courses than any other nationality. Commencements from China and the USA increased by 32.1% and 4.8% respectively and commencements from Brazil decreased by 19.2% on 2014 figures.
