


Department of Education and Training

As at year-to-date (YTD) July 2015, there were 543,123 enrolments by full-fee paying international students in Australia on a student visa. This represents a 10.6% increase on YTD July 2014 and compares with the average YTD July growth rate for enrolments of 5.5% per year over the preceding ten years.

In YTD July 2015, there were 276,087 commencements representing an 8.3% increase over the same period in 2014. This compares with the average YTD July growth rate for commencements of 6.6% per year over the preceding ten years.

The higher education sector had the largest share of enrolments at 47.7% in the YTD July 2015. Enrolments and commencements increased by 10.1% and 9.4% over the same period in 2014. China and India accounted for 36.3% and 12.4% respectively of enrolments by students in higher education. In YTD July 2015, post-graduate research commencements declined by 4.8%, while other postgraduate commencements in higher education grew by



5.0% over the same period in 2014. Bachelor degree level commencements also increased by 19.3%.

The VET sector accounted for 24.8% of total enrolments and 27.3% of total commencements respectively. Enrolments in the sector increased by 14.5% and commencements grew by 11.7% on YTD July 2014 figures. India had the largest share of total enrolments (17.5%) in YTD July 2015. The Republic of Korea and China had the next largest shares of VET enrolments with 8.3% and 8.0% respectively.

The English Language Intensive Courses for Overseas Students (ELICOS) sector accounted for 17.7% of total enrolments and 22.7% of total commencements in YTD July 2015. Enrolments and commencements increased by 6.6% and 3.5% respectively on the same period in 2014. China accounted for the largest cohort of enrolments and commencements in ELICOS with shares of 24.7% and 22.5% respectively. Brazil and Thailand were the next largest nationalities for ELICOS enrolments with 8.5% each, followed by Colombia with 7.0%.

In YTD July 2015, the schools sector accounted for 3.6% of total enrolments and total commencements respectively. Enrolments for the sector grew by 13.6% and commencements by 18.9% on YTD July 2014 figures. Asia contributed 83.7% of enrolments and 76.8% of commencements. By nationality, China had the largest share of enrolments in schools accounting for 49.6%, followed by Vietnam and the Republic of Korea at 8.7% and 6.4% respectively.

Enrolments and commencements in the non-award courses (such as exchange and foundation programs) increased by 9.9% and 2.7% respectively. China (26.5%), USA (15.4%) and Brazil (7.5%) accounted for more enrolments in non-award courses than any other nationality. Commencements from China and the USA increased by 27.4% and 5.4% respectively and commencements from Brazil declined by 52.2% on 2014 figures.
